 - 7.I. Consideration And Action To Re-Enact Noise Ordinance 1st Reading

Background:

House Bill 419 (now codified as OCGA Sec. 25-10-2) amends Chapter 60 of Title 36 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to general provisions regarding local government provisions applicable to counties and municipal corporations, so as to

enable the governing authority of certain counties to further regulate the use or ignition of consumer fireworks; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

In order to comply with the code, municipalities must enact or reenact their noise ordinance on or after July 1, 2018.

The code states that "the ordinance must be a general noise ordinance concerning all manner of sounds or noises and the municipality shall not have any ordinance separately pertaining to sounds or noises emanating exclusively from consumer fireworks; and not have been enacted or reenacted unless notice of the meeting in which such noise ordinance was enacted or reenacted was published one time at least 15 days in advance of such meeting in the legal organ of such county or municipal corporation and was posted for at least 72 hours at least 15 days in advance of such meeting on the homepage of the official website of such county or municipal corporation. Such notice shall state the date, time, and place of such meeting and that such noise ordinance which will affect the use of consumer fireworks will be acted upon."

The meeting notice was published at least 15 days in advance of this meeting and posted on the City's website in advance. The amendment to the ordinance will be added to the packet on the website on Monday, August 6th.

 - 10.I. Consideration And Action To Amend The Fireworks Ordinance 1st Reading Background:

In order to comply with House Bill 419 (now codified as OCGA Sec. 25-10-2), a municipality cannot have any ordinance separately from their noise ordinance pertaining to sounds or noises emanating exclusively from consumer fireworks. Therefore, Sec. 26-2-4 of the City of Hapeville Code of Ordinances titled "Firearms, Fireworks; Discharging Prohibited" must be amended.

10.III. Consideration And Action To Approve The Atlanta Regional Commission Invoice For Local Match In The Amount Of \$4,248.14 For The Southern Fulton County CTP

Background

The Cities of South Fulton completed their first joint Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) in 2013. The 18-month plan, led by the Fulton County Transportation Division with the assistance of the firm Arcadis, was initiated in 2012 and adopted by respective councils in the winter of 2013. The plan is to be updated every five years to reflect the latest socio-economic and land use data and serves as a guide to develop the latest priorities.

Noteworthy benefits- The update will:

- Help seek federal funding- Projects that are federally-funded must be drawn out an approved CTP
- Identify new priorities based updated socio-economic and land use information

- Enable cities to monitor system performance of TSPLOST investments
- Integrate the Transit Masterplan recommendations in the update
- Better project information for programming and project development
- Determine new priorities for a new SPLOST- financial needs, project selection and scope of work

- · Improve decision making
- Develop better cost estimates.

Within the past year, the County has met with the Cities and ARC regarding updating the plan. Additionally, the County has shared with the cities a copy of the draft Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) (attached) outlining the responsibilities of the Cities, ARC and funding commitment. 10.IV. Consideration And Action To Approve The South Fulton Chamber Of Commerce, Inc. Connect South Fulton Invoice In The Amount Of \$7,100.00 For Regional Economic Development

Background:

Connect South Fulton was created in November 2017 by the seven mayors of south Fulton county with the belief that more can be achieved to cultivate investment and economic development through regional collaboration than as individual cities. The organization's advocacy is exclusively for growing economic development and enhancing quality of life in the member cities. The Connect South Fulton member cities are: Chattahoochee Hills, College Park, East Point, Fairburn, Hapeville, Palmetto, and Union City. Connect South Fulton works to share story and opportunity for South Fulton County and the distinctive cities with investors and developers, cultivate investment in the South Fulton region, advocate locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally, and champion South Fulton county businesses of all sizes.

Through the work of branding South Fulton County as a region and defining the narrative, the goal is to make the area more competitive against other areas in metro Atlanta. The City share for Connect South Fulton is \$7,100.00. Staff recommends authorization to pay this invoice.

10.V. Consideration And Action To Approve The Corbett Group, LLC In The Amount Of \$ 360,646.50 For Emergency Construction Work On Water Lines And Sewers And Authorize Mayor Hallman To Sign All Necessary Documents.

Background:

On May 1, 2018 council requested that staff issue an RFP for any emergency repair work on the water and sewer system that requires assistance from a contractor. Large water main breaks, deep sewer line collapses and water valve repairs typically require the assistance of a contractor. This RFP assures the City has received comptetively bid unit pricing from contractors and allows the immediate repair of the damaged infrastructure. These annual contracts will include two additional one year options for renewal. The only other bidder was RDJE Inc. at \$ 1,541,979.50.

10.VI. Discussion Initiated By Councilman Horsley On Transient Merchant / Food Truck Policy Background:

Currently the Transient Merchant Ordinance (Sec. 11-11-4) requires that an applicant submit a "surety bond in the amount of \$5,000 guaranteed by an insurance company licensed to do business in the state, and that the bond is payable to the city and conditioned to pay the city or anyone else suing in its name for their use for injuries or damages arising from dishonest or fraudulent conduct in the administration of the business so permitted." Businesses working to collaborate with food truck vendors have voiced their concern about the surety bond requirement, stating that it makes it difficult to secure food trucks in the area. Most food truck vendors have general liability insurance and would like to be able to submit a general liability certificate with the City listed as an additional insured.

Additionally, the hours of operation listed in the transient vendor ordinance need to be discussed and possibly modified. Currently, the ordinance states that "transient merchants shall not sell or offer to sell merchandise between the hours of 6:00PM to 9:00AM."
